What is Homelessness?

HUD Programs

 People who are living in a place not meant for human habitation, in emergency shelters, in transitional housing, exiting an institution where temporarily resided, and fleeing domestic violence and no other residence or support.

McKinney-Vento

 Homeless children or youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence.

Myths and Misconceptions

- "If someone wants housing they can find it"
- "They want to be homeless"

Lack of affordable & accessible housing

- "They're not that sick"
- "Substance abuse is a choice"
- "They're just faking it"

Mental illness & substance abuse

Poverty

- "They can get a job"
- "Poor people are lazy"
- "They don't want to get better""

Situational & environmental stressors

- "Homelessness is a character flaw"
- "Homeless people are dangerous"

- 3,933 total persons
- 510 total children
- 686 chronically homeless
- 355 mental illness
- 260 substance abuse

HMIS (CY 2017)

- 18,340 total persons
- 4,060 total children
- 1,896 chronically homeless
- 2,277 mental illness
- 1,115 substance abuse





- Establish protocols for linking patients to local coordinated entry system
